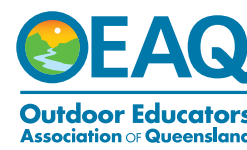


Call for papers, workshops, presentations.

19th National Outdoor Education Conference

The University of the Sunshine Coast

29 March - 1 April 2016



The 19th National Outdoor Education Conference will be convened by the Outdoor Education Association of Queensland and based at the University of the Sunshine Coast.

The success of the conference program will depend largely on the input and contribution from academics, practitioners, and administrators across a range of overlapping fields such as: outdoor education, outdoor recreation, environmental education, adventure education and adventure therapy. The purpose of this communiqué is to invite you to submit an expression of interest to be involved in the program. In addition to the traditional conference presentations and workshops, a significant point of difference of the program is that on Thursday 31 March, we are organizing workshops in the field. These workshops will use a broad range of activities to focus on a diverse range of topics.

We are inviting expressions of interest for the following:

1. **Full conference papers.** These presentations will allow for 40 minute presentations (including question time) aligned with the conference theme. A title and abstract of no more than 200 words must be provided by **16 November 2015**. Delegates whose submissions are accepted will be required to submit full papers (3-5000 words) by CoB on **15 February 2016**. There will be the opportunity to have papers peer-reviewed. Papers that are accepted in this one-stage process will be published as “peer-reviewed” conference papers on the OEA website. Authors can alternatively have their work published as non-peer reviewed paper. Selected authors may be invited to publish their work in other publications such as an anthology, or a special edition of AJOE.
2. **Practitioner’s workshops.** In these sessions delegates will have 40 minutes to facilitate activities that will promote discussion, participation and learning aligned with the conference theme. A title and abstract of no more than 200 words must be provided by **16 November 2015**. Delegates whose submissions are accepted will be invited to submit pre-conference material (2-3000 words) by CoB on **15 February 2016**.
3. **In-the-field presentation.** These presentations will occur in the context of a range of field trips. They will be 20-minute presentations centered around particular themes, and taking place in the context of participating in particular activities, at particular places. The presentations will be aligned with the conference theme and followed by periods of informal activity/ exploration/ discussion with other participants. The draft list of proposed activities and places is listed below. A team of local experts will facilitate the overall field trip and integrated workshops. A title and abstract of no more than 200 words must be provided by **12 October 2015** (note earlier date). Delegates whose submissions are successful will be required to submit some pre-conference reading for participants by **7 March 2016** in an attempt to flip the ‘classroom’ and stimulate engagement before the field trip.

All delegates who submit an expression of interest will be notified of the outcome within three weeks of the submission date. Please include: Preferred presentation type, Field Trip option (if applicable), Title, Abstract, Name, Organisation, Email address, and short 100 word Bio statement.
